February Faith in Action: UU Mass Action

Since 2006 UU Mass Action (https://www.uumassaction.org) has been organizing and mobilizing the 20,000 Unitarian Universalists and 142 congregations in Massachusetts to confront oppression. Their pathways to justice are selected by identifying the priorities in which our congregations are engaged, engaging in our coalition partners' shared priorities, assessing legislative momentum, and identifying who are the most vulnerable people in our Commonwealth. Current legislative campaigns include climate and environmental justice; decarceration and end solitary; housing and economic justice; immigrant justice; and indigenous justice. On February 16th, our special guest speaker was Karl Claire Müller from UU Mass Action, and they gave a powerful sermon again with an invitation to become involved in their UU Mass Action State House Advocacy Day on Tuesday, April 8th!

2/15/25 Statement by the Canton Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee

We as citizens of this nation must learn and share our history both the good and the bad.

These are a few examples of the unfortunate events that have occurred in our history.

CDEI stands in support of the urgent release of hostages in the Middle East and beyond. The hostages are innocent men, women and children from Israel, and many other countries. They have been held for almost 500 days in horrific and inhumane conditions. We hope for their safe return home to their families.

We must learn to talk about the treatment of Indigenous people who have had to endure the torture and trauma of their native land being stolen from them. We must acknowledge the systemic disadvantages of ultimately displacing these indigenous peoples to reservations, all the while thinking this was a good idea for others.

Slavery was prevalent in our country and forced us into a Civil War. This brought the loss of so many American soldiers and the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

The plight of enslaved African Americans has led to racism, prejudice, and discrimination. Slavery has left an intergenerational legacy of trauma in Black communities.

During World War 2, we forced the rounding up of the American Asian population which then led to forced detainment because our government assumed their loyalty was with Japan.

High ranking government officials knew that the slaughter of Jews was going on in Europe. We waited so long to enter the war which resulted in over six millions Jews being murdered for the sake of their religious beliefs.

In the 1980's when the AIDS crisis took place, President Ronald Regan first discussed the virus only after four years, by which point the virus had spread throughout communities and ultimately became a pandemic. Tens of thousands of Americans were infected with the AIDS virus with no treatment, no education and no compassion, which lead to a generations of men and women losing their lives.

This current administration is now trying to wipe out all DEI programs which allows us as a nation to learn, to heal, and to never allow history repeat itself. In Canton this will NOT be the case. We are not going away. We are determined and we will go before the select board to request for funds in support of our causes and initiatives.

As noted in our mission statement, EVERYONE is welcome in this town. We will continue to do the work through quality events that showcase our diversity as an integral part of who we are.

History has shown us the disastrous consequences of ignorance and silence. We are determined as a committee never to accept or allow this happen in our town. History will never be repeated in Canton.

Land and Labor Acknowledgement

The First Parish Unitarian Universalist-Canton, MA [Adopted at the FPUU Annual Meeting on 6/4/24]

The First Parish Unitarian Universalist-Canton is proud to be a major historical church of Canton, representing a consolidation of two of Canton's oldest churches – the First Parish Unitarian, founded in the 18th century and the First Universalist Church, founded in the 19th century. We recognize that our church's history is complicated by the combined legacies of colonialism and slavery in the United States context. We acknowledge the history of Indigenous peoples and the dispossession of their lands, including that these original lands in Canton and neighboring towns were named Ponkapoag by indigenous peoples. We pay our respects to the Neponset Band, among other bands, of the Massachusett Tribe, who have stewarded this land throughout generations. We honor their continued presence here and throughout their diaspora. We also acknowledge that we in Canton do not exist independently from centuries of forced labor and economic extraction from enslaved and indentured Black Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC), including children, as well as poor white immigrants/residents suffering abusive child labor and economic exploitation. And we want to affirm that although we cannot change history, we can and will work for justice, and that justice first begins in direct relationship with mutual recognition and acknowledgment of our shared history, experiences, and interactions. We celebrate and work in solidarity with BIPOC organizations leading the movement for our collective liberation, and we choose to build a diverse, multicultural Beloved Community casting out racism and oppression in ourselves and our institutions.
